#### The Impact that Accountants have within the FBI

**Karen Lee Ferguson**, Senior Supervisory Resident Agent, Nashville Resident Agency, Memphis Division *Federal Bureau of Investigation, Memphis, Tenn.* 

**K** aren Lee Ferguson is the senior supervisory resident agent for the Nashville resident agency of the Memphis (Tenn.) division of the FBI. She will discuss the impact that professionals in the accounting field have within the bureau.

The agency now known as the FBI was founded in 1908 and officially received its title, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, in 1935. The bureau is the principal investigative arm of the United States Department of Justice. The FBI has investigative jurisdiction over violations of more than 200 categories of federal crimes. The bureau is also authorized to investigate matters where no prosecution is contemplated. For example, the FBI conducts background security checks concerning nominees to sensitive government positions.

Ferguson has worked for the FBI since 1987 in Memphis, Tenn., Quantico, Va., and Philadelphia, Pa. Prior to joining the bureau, she held positions as a deputy sheriff in the Richland County Sheriff's Office and as a probation/parole agent with the South Carolina Department of Probation and Parole, both in Columbia, S.C. She holds a bachelor's degree in psychology and a master's degree in criminal justice. •

#### Working Together and Playing Together Makes Life More Fun

any professionals in the field of accounting find contentment in a M job well done. Kim Keepper, supervising senior, and Diana Johnson, CPA, senior manager, both of KPMG LLP in Nashville, Tenn. do find fulfillment through their careers as auditors, but they also find a sense of accomplishment outside of work. They have a shared hobby - scuba diving.

Keepper's interest in scuba was peaked by relatives and friends who dive. She learned what steps she needed to take to become certified and began training. "I attended two weekends of pool and classroom instruction," she says. "We learned all the skills we needed to venture into the ocean." Diving in open water (an ocean, gulf, lake, or quarry) is mandatory to receive a scuba certification card (c-card). Around the world, divers must have a c-card in order to rent air tanks. "I had to complete two ocean dives a day for two days with a certified instructor. The dive master required me to demonstrate the skills I learned in pool training. Once you perform the skills adequately, you can be certified," explains Keepper.

Scuba is an acronym for self-contained underwater breathing apparatus. In 1943, French oceanographers Jacques Yves Cousteau and Emil Gagnan invented the portable breathing

After earning her c-card in the Florida Keys in August 1996,

Keepper took diving trips to the Bahamas, and St. Croix, Virgin Islands later that year.


Stories of her adventures inspired then co-worker Lisa Lewis to explore scuba diving as a hobby in July 1997. "Lisa was my first victim," Keepper reports. Lewis began her scuba training in Nashville, and finished the certification

process in Cozumel, Mexico. "When Lisa became certified, we enjoyed diving in the mornings, and the Cozumel nightlife in the evenings," says Keepper. Lewis and Keepper also traveled to Maui, Hawaii in May 1998.

Keepper planned a return trip to Hawaii, and Lewis opted to join her. Their travel experiences caught the attention of Diana Johnson.

"Scuba diving was something I always wanted to try when I found the time," Johnson says. "Kim and Lisa talked about how much fun they had and invited me to come to Hawaii."

Before taking the flight over the Pacific, Johnson went to Panama



Panama City Beach that weekend, assisting the dive master. In addition to basic scuba certification, Keepper has completed advanced and rescue certification, and is working toward becoming an instructor. While watching some students on a boat wreck

dive, she bumped into the wreck. "I looked down and saw a six-inch gash in my leg," she explains. "I didn't want to miss any prime dive time, so we found some duct tape on the boat and wrapped my leg. Duct tape holds anything together!"

In September 1999, Johnson, Keepper, and Lewis, who has transferred to KPMG's Mexico City office, traveled to the largest of the Hawaiian Islands, Hawaii (also known as The Big Island). Johnson recalls her favorite dive from the trip, a nighttime manta ray feeding dive. "After dark, our group dove to the ocean floor. It was a little unnerving not being able to see what was in the water around me. Once we reached the designated spot, we knelt in a large circle and held flashlights over our heads with the light pointing upward. Plankton (microscopic algae and protozoa) are attracted to light, and manta rays feed on plankton. The manta rays were huge! They swooped around capturing plankton. They were diving right above us, sometimes even brushing our heads or flashlights."

Outside of the ocean and the office, Johnson likes to travel to visit family and friends, read, and do projects around the house. Keepper enjoys outdoor activities like hiking and white water rafting. ❖
