Siekmann sails **Amendments pass**

Bob Siekmann and all three charter amendments win in landslides.

Siekmann won 72.6% of the vote against Gene Jaleski.

Newly elected Longboat Key District 5 Commissioner Robert Siekmann celebrated Tuesday night his second-term and 1,185-vote victory over firsttime candidate Gene Jaleski by sharing a victory party.

In sharp contrast to his 2006 election, when he held his own victory party at The Market and squeaked out a slim 201-vote win over Miles Leavitt, Siekmann opted to share his landslide of 72.6% of the vote with what he perceives as a bigger win for Longboat Key: the approval of two charter amendment questions that he hopes will spur Key modernization and boost island tourism.

"I was nervous this time because I wanted it that much more," Siekmann said. "I want to be on this commission to get an opportunity to shape Longboat's future."

In Manatee County, Siekmann received 62.7% of the vote, or 591 votes, compared to Jaleski's 37.3%, or 351 votes. In Sarasota County, the commissioner received 78.1% of the vote, or 1,312 votes, compared to Jaleski's 21.9%, or 367 votes.

"It's not about how many votes, though," Siekmann said.

The first two amendments allow existing grandfathered tourism and condominium units to be converted to legal units at their current density and create a pool of 250 tourism units that could be added to the Key's existing hotel and resort rooms. The 250 units was said to be the difference between the number of units on the Key in 2000 — the year the Holiday Inn shut

HISTORY OF THE LONGBOAT: Since The Longboat Observer's founding, the newspaper has used a rendering of a "longboat" as one of its identifying symbols. According to historical accounts, when Juan Anasco, scout for Spanish explorer Hernando De Soto, anchored off the coast of Longboat Key in 1538, Anasco and his crew used "longboats" to get through the pass from the Gulf of Mexico to Sarasota Bay.

"I'm just glad to be sticking around to do the work that needs to be done."

Meanwhile, Jaleski opted to hear the news from interim Town Clerk Trish Granger from his Village home, where he retreated after spending the day shaking hands with the voters.

Upon hearing the results, Jaleski said he was pleased to receive his 718 total votes.

"I wish Bob Siekmann well," Jaleski said. "I enjoyed running immensely and will be back next year."

Jaleski said he plans to get more involved in town affairs and will attempt to attain a seat on the Longboat Key Planning and Zoning Board.

"I plan to continue my work with island cell-phone reception and bring fresh beach-renourishment ideas to the table," Jaleski said.

Siekmann and Jaleski differed over both topics during the course of their campaigns.

The race and charter-amendment questions apparently spurred voter turnout, albeit smaller than in the two previous years.

Two weeks of early voting resulted in a 24% voter turnout. And with 2,621 total votes cast Keywide, that totaled 41.2% of the town's 6,364 registered voters casting a ballot.

During the last commission race in 2006, 44.2% of the voters cast ballots for Siekmann's first race against Leavitt. And in 2005, 47% of the town's registered voters went to the polls for the race between Vice Mayor George Spoll and Bob Sewell.

A crowd of about 50 people gathered around Siekmann to celebrate as he shook hands with commissioners and



received a hug and a kiss from his wife, Mimi.

"I am happy that Bob received another term and wish him well in my seat," said Mayor and current District 5 Commissioner Jeremy Whatmough, who has reached his term limit this month.

Vice Mayor George Spoll also congratulated Siekmann.

"He was as calm, cool and collected as he was during the last election," Spoll said. "He has earned a second term, and the voters agree."
