
Indiana teen still missing more than a week later

An immobile Indiana teen has been missing for over a week, according to authorities. They believe she is in "grave danger."

Aleah Beckerle, 19, of Evansville, Indiana, was reported missing by her mother, Cara Beckerle on July 17.

According to [NBC](#), Cara woke that Sunday, and discovered that Aleah was not in their home.

A stroke as an infant had rendered Aleah to a wheel chair, and in need of constant care, [NBC](#) reported. She cannot walk, and struggles to speak but a few words.

Police said that both her wheel chair, and medication to control seizures were left behind.

"There is someone out there who knows where Aleah is," Evansville Police Department Captain Andy Chandler told [NBC](#).

"You can't just carry a disabled 10-year-old out of her home and have no one see anything."

Last week, Cara posted photos of Aleah's room on Facebook, writing, "I need to see her and be able to lay in her bed and play our games that was special just for us."

A Facebook group - "Bring Aleah Home - has been created to share well-wishes, and organize public efforts to help in the search for the missing teen. As of 12:30 p.m. on Tuesday, the group had 6,254 members.

"PLEASE whoever has Aleah please let her go back to her friend's and family," Piper M. Blackard posted in the group on Tuesday. "I don't know why you did this and I don't really care why. All that matters here is Aleah and her well being." Chandler told NBC that the authorities are "conducting numerous interviews and are focused on finding [Aleah]."

"We welcome any information anyone might have," he continued.

"Bring Back Aleah," describes the teenager as 4'10" tall, 95lbs, with short, brown hair, and brown eyes, and of both Caucasian, and African-American race. She was last seen wearing a black t-shirt with the words "Dance Theater," on it NBC reported.
