Happ-E Holidays!

Legend has it that the first commercial holiday cards were commissioned by <u>Sir Henry Cole</u> in London in 1843. Two batches totaling 2,050 cards were printed and sold that year for a <u>shilling</u> each (shillings are obsolete now, but would have a value of about 18 cents today). Fast forward 167 years . . . The Greeting Card Association says that holiday cards now account for about 27% of the seven *billion* paper cards sold each year – a staggering 1.75 billion cards. (And if you want to get some dirty looks, try paying with shillings at your local Hallmark.) At 1.75 billion cards, the cost of holiday cards isn't just monetary, it's also environmental!

Approximately 80% of all Americans currently have an email address (including 7% of newborn babies, if you can believe that). Instead of sending traditional paper letters or cards through the mail this year, consider creating electronic holiday cards and letters and sending them in an e-mail. Electronic greetings not only save paper and postage, but also the fuel and other resources required to deliver paper cards.

Pall Corporation took good advantage of this green initiative last year when it switched to electronic cards. As a result, our company saved thousands of dollars on printing and postage costs, not to mention paper. Best of all, you don't need to be a programmer or an artist to create a card you can be proud of; personalized e-cards are quick and easy to make with standard software. Microsoft Office, for example, features holiday theme backgrounds that you can use to create a PDF card. Other common programs feature holiday-themed stationary templates that are perfect for creating unique letters and cards.

Did you know it costs on average a whopping \$8.60 for a Pall employee to print a 100 page document in color.

That same document in b&w only costs \$1.10! So while saving some green, save some green (\$)!
