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


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Philadelphia's Weird and Wild Sandwiches

Philadelphia might be known for cheesesteaks, but there are plenty of other noteworthy sandwiches available at eateries in the city. And many are like nothing you've seen before. Here are some of the most unusual gut-busting, mouth-watering selections from area restaurants.

The SHAME Burger: It's all in the name, folks. This massive burger found at The Wishing Well on 9th Street is enough to make a grown man cry. A sirloin patty is topped with American cheese, a fried egg and a piece of scrapple. Yes, scrapple. This monster of a sandwich is best attempted when you're famished. 767 S. 9th St.; 215-238-6555

The Bolognese: Lasagna is usually a meal all on its own, but Philly sandwich shop Paesano's believes it's just as good delivered between two buns. This sandwich boasts fried meat-filled lasagna, red sauce, smoked mozzarella, sharp provolone cheese, sweet peppers and a fried egg all on a soft hoagie roll. One bite of this bad boy and you'll be celebrating a new Italian tradition

The Natural Disaster: Sometimes the best food comes from a truck -- or, in this case, a trailer. The U Got Munchies food truck located just off of Temple's campus at 1321 Norris St. provides some of the most outrageous, heart-slowing sandwiches in the city. And this one is epic. They shove steak, crispy chicken tenders, French fries, cheese whiz, American cheese and fried onions all together on a roll in one heck of a culinary feat.

The Mac & Cheese Burger: Basically Burgers, a small family-run joint in Doylestown, is known for making some unusual burgers. And one of the most tempting on the menu is the Mac & Cheese Burger: a juicy beef patty piled high with ooey, gooey macaroni and cheese and accented with grilled tomatoes and cheddar. But if you're not in the mood for noodles on your burger, you can always have one with jalapeno poppers instead.

The Philly Taco: This requires a little bit of DIY spirit, but if you're willing and able, you can get your hands



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
