THEN and NOW

Voted number one in the world, Dallas's skyline would be unrecognizable without the iconic Reunion Tower. Originally built as a free-standing structure and part of an urban redevelopment project in 1978, the 561-foot tower quickly became a key landmark of the city. With 837 steps to the top of the tower's stairwell, most individuals prefer the 68-second elevator ride to the structure's newly renovated Geo-Deck, Five Sixty restaurant, and Cloud Nine Cafe.

With rapid societal and technological advances, Reunion Tower's management team decided it was time to renovate in 2007. According to the tower's general manager, Dusti Groskreutz, the new design was intended to allow visitors of Dallas to engage with the city in a new way.

"The goal was to re-open the space utilizing world-class design features such as unique lighting elements and an interactive 50foot halo touchscreen that would immerse guests in a personalized experience," Groskreutz said.



of the most popular settings for date nights, anniversary dinners, and marriage proposals," Groskreutz said. "We average one proposal per day and growing!"

"You've won me over", said a recent tower visitor, Amy T. " I've always felt like Dallas lacked that wow factor or just something that makes you love it a little more, that is until I came here...It was quite beautiful and romantic."

Just one floor up from the Geo-Deck, visitors can enjoy a more casual dining experience by the celebrated Wolfgang Puck at the revolving Cloud Nine Cafe. A dual purpose space, the cafe offers dining with a view during the day and becomes a private event space at night.

"The views during the day change from the views that are offered at night, so you really can experience the city in two different lights," Groskreutz said. "Both settings are available to host corporate events, press conferences, birthday parties, weddings, engagements, and private dinners."

History at its best, the tower, located merely 1,000 feet from the site of the John F. Kennedy assassination, hosts a video featuring a first-hand experience of the nation-changing event on each of the Geo-Deck's touch screens.
