SERVICES & SPECIALTIES

Specialty care, such as oncology and orthopedics, require significant resources and are expensive for hospitals to provide.



RANGE OF SERVICES

Many hospitals are intentionally equipped to care for more severely ill or injured patients and provide a full range of diagnostic and treatment services.




INTENSITY OF CARE Services – such as trauma, neonatal intensive care and burn units - require highly trained and specialized staff on-site or on-call 24/7.




CAPITAL EXPENSES

Investments in technology, equipment and facility improvements vary by hospital. The costs of improvements and how they are paid for loans, leases or purchases – can affect what patients pay.

STAFFING

The number of professionals employed, how much they earn and how a hospital is staffed varies greatly among hospitals. Salaries are typically higher in urban settings and areas with higher

costs of living.



Each physician's education, training, experience and area

voluntarily provide programs at their own expense such as free or reduced-cost health screenings, education, immunizations and other health care services.


Hospitals generally get paid
