TRADE

Resume NAFTA renegotiation;
AMLO's team to work with EPN's team.

Relocate Mexican customs 20-30 km inland from the U.S.-Mexico border.

Establish a special trade zone on the northern border of Mexico: decrease the VAT rate, business tax rate & energy taxes, and increase the minimum wage.



Establish **development plans** between the U.S., Mexico, and Central America to foster economic development. Allocate 25% of investments to improve **security and border control**.

Each government will control its borders and combat trafficking of drugs and weapons.

AMLO's Proposal – Special Border Region Zone

Establish a special trade zone along the northern border of Mexico.

- Relocate Mexican customs 20-30 km inland from the border.
- Decrease the rate of Value Added Tax (*Impuesto al Valor Agregado, IVA*) from 16% to 8% (amount will vary to match the adjacent U.S. state sales tax).
- Reduce Business Income Taxes (Impuesto Sobre la Renta, ISR) to 20%.
- Increase the minimum wage.
- Decrease energy prices by reducing the Special Taxes on Production and Services (*Impuestos Especiales a la Producción y Servicios, IEPS*).
- Create Urban development plans in the border cities.
- Objective: Increase consumption and competition at the border.

Tasks Ahead from a Border Region Perspective

- NAFTA talks are an opportunity: Continue to press for attention to border infrastructure and facilitation mayors can coordinate to present a consistent message to Congress, Governors, and Cabinet Secretaries.
- Border facilitation improvements: Seek a commitment to on-going work to improve border crossing times and procedures and to adopt best practices across North America, including consistent regulations, processes and rules.

Tasks Ahead from a Border Region Perspective

- Border Infrastructure: Build into NAFTA and Congressional approval references to the importance of maintaining modern border infrastructure and sufficient staffing.
- Seek creation of more efficient and better coordinated bi-national planning mechanisms, and trilateral planning where relevant, for example on transportation corridors.
- Develop federal, state and local strategies: Join voices in a border alliance to talk with the Federal governments about overall resource needs and policies that have effect all along the border.

Tasks Ahead from a Border Region Perspective

- Economic development: Champion coordinated multi-year regional plans with local, State and Federal buy-in.
- Improve communication and coordination between local and federal governments of both sides of the border.
- Regularly bring together stakeholders to share know-how and expertise.
- Institutionalize regional alliances and pan-border relationships to ensure continuity.
- Organize coordinated outreach plans promote the economic and security importance of the border region.

U.S.-Mexico Relations: Early Months Set Tone

Trade:

• Successfully complete NAFTA re-negotiation; best outcome as a trilateral.

Bilateral Security, Migration and Border Cooperation:

- Avoid further deterioration in cooperation. Collaborative review of programs.
- Find shared approaches to managing migration and travel issues.
- Continue collaboration on intercepting terrorists.
- More effective work against organized crime: multi-pronged effort against drug production, distribution, logistics, finance networks, and addiction/demand; attack arms and people smuggling.
- Support Mexico in reducing violence and improving capacity & institutions.
- Effective joint support for Central America on root causes of migration.

U.S.-Mexico Relations: Early Months Set Tone

Improve Competitiveness:

- Enhance technology, information sharing and processes to improve security and facilitate of legitimate trade and travel.
- Invest in programs, including workforce development and education, to develop the complimentary nature of the two economies, create jobs and improve global competitiveness.

Rebuilding Confidence:

• Take steps to rebuild trust; avoid becoming "Distant Neighbors" again.
