Mario Draghi: Europe will drift into "uncharted waters"

Tensions between the Eurozone and its most embattled economy plunged deeper into the red this week, with fears of a Greek exit that could cause shockwaves throughout the continent.

Mario Draghi, European Central Bank President, claimed Europe would drift into "uncharted waters" should Greece continue their emboldened resistance to austerity measures, risking a default of their €324bn debt.

Mr. Draghi, speaking at the International Monetary Fund's spring meetings in Washington, said: "The short-term danger of contagion [from a Greek exit] is difficult to assess, but we have enough buffers in place. And even though they were designed for different circumstances, they are sufficient. But we are entering uncharted waters."



The warning comes only weeks before Greece's new, radical left government is to agree a fresh rescue package with their increasingly frustrated creditors.

The proposed €7.2bn loan is yet another



stumbling block in the EU's long road out of recession, with senior IMF figures suggesting that demands on Greece be streamlined and simplified, whilst their creditors accuse Greece of failing to provide sufficient reforms to secure the critical funds.

Yet Draghi was quick to point out that the goal of the talks were to accomplish "a comprehensive package within which the policies can be monitored".

When asked on the possibility of a Grexit, Mr Draghi said: "I don't want to contemplate such an event because the Greek leaders have said they will always meet their commitments."


The words top a turbulent week in the already fractious relationship between Greece's Syriza administration and the EU, fuelling fears that a compromise may not be reached.

Speaking earlier this week in Washington, German Finance Minister Wolfgang Schaeube said: "The Europeans have said, OK, we are ready to do it [lend money] until 2020... If you find someone else, whether it's in Beijing, in Moscow, in Washington DC, or in New York who will lend you money, ok, fine, we would be happy. But it's difficult to find someone who is lending you in this situation amounts [of] €200bn."

Syriza's bargaining power at the negotiations has been further damaged after their borrowing costs soared to 27%, up 3.5 percentage points, and their credit rating was downgraded by ratings agency S&P.


