The American Statistics Index is a comprehensive index of America, including 5000 titles and more than 500 periodicals. The topics indexed in ASI include the executive branch of the federal government and the federal court and judicial system, as well as many quasi-official organizations, boards, congressional committees, regulatory agencies, as well as demographic and economic statistics. The ASI covers all types of statistical publications such as periodicals and special reports. The ASI is updated annually and available in CD-ROM format. (C-31) (EAB 200915-673-501 U)

The Centre for Economic Policy Research (CEPR) is a network of over 700 European researchers. This network was created so that researchers could collaborate and have a common place to disseminate and collect research. Included in the various networking projects and publications of the CEPR is their *Discussion Paper Series*, which makes available current, unpublished materials as well as over 3000 discussion papers published since 1999. The purpose for this series is to provide researchers with up-to-date changes on issues in the field of economics and to provide the authors with feedback and criticism for their work. Discussion papers can be retrieved by searching keywords, authors, years, and phrases, or by browsing a list of topics and areas of research. (JPT 201015-673-501 N)

Available electronically through CSA Illumina, DIALOG, EBSCOhost, OCLC's First Search, Ovid or SilverPlatter, and EconLit for Members on the web, Econlit is the electronic bibliography of the American Economic Association. EconLit is also available in the print volume collections, Index of Economic Articles in Journals & Collective Volumes and the Journal of Economic Literature Index. As one of the most significant sources for economic literature, this resource provides a comprehensive index of multiple resources including key economics journals, as well as books and book reviews, collective volume articles, and dissertations and working papers. Covering material published between 1969 and the present, EconLit contains more than 925,000 bibliographic citations with more than 65,000 additional citations added annually. First published in 1969 EconLit once covered a mere 182 titles and now covers more than 1,400 journal titles alone. While it mostly contains citations and bibliographic information, some full text exists. In addition, EconLit's scope is global with articles, journal, and other resources stemming from foreign countries as well as a plethora of languages. (C-28) (SEK 200915 673-501 U)

This resource is an effort to index all economics departments, institutes, and research centers in the world. It is maintained, and was created by, Christian Zimmermann of the University of Connecticut, Department of Economics. The site is hosted by the University of Connecticut College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. The index can be sorted by alphabetically by country, country by continent, country by ISO 3166 country code, location, subject, purpose, associations and societies, and Boolean text search. There is also a short cut to the United States listings. Each listing provides the location, contact information, including webpage and e-mail when known, areas of function, and RePEc handle. The site also contains a page labeled "other goodies" which lists to job resources, software, IDEAS, and a list of recommended economics resources. (KDD 200925-673-900 N)

IDEAS. Research Papers in Economics. 7 times/wk. Online format. URL: http://ideas.repec.org/

IDEAS is home to over 950,000 research items, over 825,000 of which are available in full text, free of charge. This site is run by the Department of Economics at the University of Connecticut and houses published works (including journal articles, chapters, software, and books) and working papers in economics and various subsets of economics. The working papers provide the latest information in the field and give researchers the ability to keep up-to-date on emerging topics in the field. The site also allows the user to search based on the Journal of Economic Literature (JEL) codes or by an individual handle given to articles by RePEc, which includes archive code (by institution), a series code, and an item code. The entries can also be searched by specific keywords, by the abstract, by words or phrases in the whole text, by author, and by title. (C-29) (SDK 201015-673-501 U)

Index of International Statistics (IIS) Washington DC: Congressional Information Services, 1983-present. Print resource.

The IIS covers statistical material published by such organizations as The United Nations, The European Union, The Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, The Organization of American States, as well as development banks and regional and special purpose organizations. The statistical information is cataloged and put in bibliographies that are content described and index by subject and geographic region. Over 2500 titles are cover by the IIS. The resource is released monthly and available in a CD-ROM format. (C-45) (EAB 200915-673-501 U)

This online resource is a catalogue of United Nations(UN) documents and publications indexed by the UN Dag Hammarskjöld Library and the Library of the UN Office at Geneva. Commercial publications and other non-UN sources held in the collection of the Dag Hammarskjöld Library are also included. The coverage of UNBISnet is from 1979 onward, however, older documents are being added to the catalogue on a regular basis as a result of retrospective conversion. UNBISnet also provides instant access to a growing number of full text resources in the six official languages of the UN (Arabic, Chinese, English, French, Russian and Spanish), including resolutions adopted by the General Assembly, the Economic and Social Council and the Security Council from 1946 onward. Citations to speeches made in the General Assembly beginning with its 38th session (1983-), the Security Council beginning with its 38th year (1983-), the Economic and Social Council beginning in 1983 and the Trusteeship Council beginning with its 15th special session (1982) can also be located using this Index. Links to the full text of speeches are provided. The Index allows researchers to identify articles on current socio-economic issues, like financial reforms in sovereign states affected by economic recession and their impact on the citizens of those nations. Many of the publications have an international perspective that examine the relationship between variables to determine what the future economic scenario will be. This in turn is studied by public policy makers bearing in mind the economic history of the country or regions like the European Union. The Social Science Research Network is an online database allowing users to search for published works in more than a dozen social science fields, including finances, entrepreneurship, and economics. Users can now search and browse by paper, author, or subject, and can also submit their own works for inclusion in the database. Those interested in economics can also search through the Economics Research Network for information on research papers, conference proceedings, and professional directories, as well as available job postings. Along with extensive new search and browse features, users can now also click links to both top papers and top authors, which showcase the most searched for and utilized information in the database. The SSRN now contains many new resources as well, over 224,000 abstracts and 180,000 full text articles. This database is free to use by the public and the majority of resources available are free to view, while some require a small fee to access. (C-30) (CFL 200825-673-901 U)




