**After a fracture, patients may grapple with pain, physical limitations, and other challenges<sup>2</sup>**

- Approximately 9 out of 10 women worry about fracturing again<sup>1</sup>
- 4 out of 5 women were afraid that they would be less able to perform their daily activities<sup>1</sup>
- 7 out of 10 women were concerned about reducing activities with family and friends<sup>1</sup>
